Pottlitzer's Prize Della bia



ocal anglers are still talking about the fish WPBFC member **Jay Pottlitzer** landed earlier this year. Here's how he caught the fish of a lifetime and landed in the WPBFC All Time Club Record Book. It was a clear day in mid-May. Reports of an improving dolphin bite prompted Jay and Diane DiMarco to venture offshore Jupiter Inlet in search of mahi. Before long they found themselves over 20 miles out and battling gaffer dolphin they had hooked while trolling. That was when the real fire drill began. "There were some other free swimmers around. Diane's fish was ready for the gaff when the big fish first swam into view. So I told her to be patient while I baited a pitch rod. I had a Penn Torque spinning reel outfit rigged with braided line and a 60 pound fluorocarbon leader ready to go. I pitched a fresh squid out, then I gaffed her fish, and it wasn't long before I saw the line on my pitch rod screaming towards the bow. I didn't really know how big it was until the fish went airborne and began greyhounding continued on Page 12

Palm Beach Patterns

A Seasonal Playbook for Saltwater Angling off Central & Northern Palm Beach County

ew places offer the incredible variety of saltwater fish and year-round fishing access that Palm Beach County has to offer. There is literally something to fish for everyday of the year. The Gulfstream plays an influential role. Nowhere off the entire eastern seaboard does this life giving, warm water current come any closer to the U.S. than off our shores. Our subtropical climate, a continental shelf that begins to abruptly widen off Jupiter and a safe deep-water inlet play supportive roles. It is no wonder that the Palm Beaches has been the scene of many groundbreaking innovations in our sport. Having processed countless fishing contest, tournament and All Time Club Record entries over the past 26 years at the West Palm Beach Fishing Club, I have been in a unique position to observe very distinct seasonal fishing patterns, along with the environmental factors that trigger the arrival or departure of fish off our coast. The following is by no means a definitive guide

to fishing the Palm Beaches (there are no absolutes in fishing), but rather a solid template for what kind of fishing to anticipate as the season progresses. I hope this angling playbook aids newcomers to the area, or helps experienced anglers plan specific trips, or at the very least, serve as a reminder of the fantastic fishing we are blessed with off Palm Beach County.

JANUARY

The sailfish sector of the Gulfstream is at its best this time of year. Finding pods of bait, a clean water edge or a temperature break will lead you to the fish. Kite fishing is the technique of choice, allowing anglers to effectively concentrate their efforts in very specific depths over the narrow shelf. Live goggle-eye, small blue runners and sardines are among the best baits to use. Deploying a drift anchor will help you stay in the strike zone longer. The Jupiter Ledge, the zone east of the Breakers and the Bath & Tennis Club on Palm Beach, and the waters off Boynton's Martini Glass water tower are historically productive areas for sails. Depth is key. Be sure to monitor radio chatter (VHF 19 is


Clubhouse Gets a Facelift

Bartels and a crew of five of his best carpenters from Yellowfin Builders donated their time and materials to replace rotten siding, doors and

trim. Only identical wood siding was used in order to maintain the building's historical integrity. Longtime club member **Mike Davidson** of CKG Painting and his crew followed up with a fresh coast of paint

for the building and outside patio area.

The unassuming wood frame facility was built in 1941. Through the years the building has become a repository of local sport fishing and boating memorabilia, which includes a significant



no - simply because it is


too costly for the club to carry embroi-

Club Volunteers Needed for Lagoon Restoration Work

portion of the Lake Worth Lagoon, now covered in muck, will be reborn as a thriving ecosystem of seagrass beds and mangroves that will nurture fish, oysters and wildlife... and attract anglers and kayakers. That is the goal of the Grassy Flats restoration project, scheduled to begin next spring. The project is located on the lagoon's east side in the area between Southern Boulevard and Lake Avenue off the Town of Palm Beach. The project is a cooperative effort supported by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Palm Beach County Environmental Resources Management, the Marine Industries Association of Palm Beach

County and the West Palm Beach Fishing Club (WPBFC). Fishing Club Members will be playing an active role in this project when it comes time to plant mangroves, probably sometime in late 2014. WPBFC members will be asked to help monitor the project as it matures as well.

The Lake Worth Lagoon is the largest estuary in Palm Beach County, stretching from North Palm Beach to Ocean Ridge and separated from the Atlantic Ocean by Singer Island and Palm Beach Island. The Grassy Flats project will cap a 12 acre area of muck sediment with approxi-

mately 48,000 cubic yards of sand. Two islands will be constructed that will be seeded with nearly 3,000 red mangroves and 25,000 cordgrass plugs. Approximately 5,300 tons of limestone rock will be used to stabilize the islands, which will also provide a suitable substrate for oyster recruitment and growth. Seagrasses, a vital component to any healthy estuary, are expected to naturally move into the restored



sandy shallows as well.

The USFWS will spend \$777,000 on the Grassy Flats project, with state and local partners providing \$351,000 in public funds and in-kind services to match the federal contribution. The project will also receive \$110,000 from FDEP through NOAA's Coral Reef Conservation Program. Palm Beach County is supplying most of the local dollars for the project.

"We have seen tangible benefits in a very short period time with other restoration projects the club has been involved with," said WPBFC President **Tom Twyford**, "The birds, fiddler crabs, oysters and mangroves blossomed, and the fish weren't far behind. With recent impacts from excessive freshwater discharges this year the lagoon

needs all the help it can get. The Fishing Club will be looking for strong volunteer support from its membership when we get into the planting phase of the project. Volunteer op-

portunities like this are ideally suited for Fishing Club families and kids who need community service hours for their school. I can't think of a better way to cultivate the next generation of marine resource stewards."




The young men are now


its because the family has owned and operated Mullins



Waldner Researching **Hybrid Snapper**

Palm Beach Atlantic University (PBAU) marine biology professor Dr. Ray Waldner, a longtime WPBFC member, is finalizing some interesting research on a locally caught snapper that looks like a cross between a yellowtail and lane snapper. Waldner, along with fellow PBAU professor Dr. Cynthia Toth and PBAU marine biology graduate Jessica Pinder are authoring a paper related to the unique fish. They are conducting a biochemical com-



parison of the hybrid snapper (once referred to as Lutjanus ambiguus, the Cuban snapper, in the ichthyological literature) and its parental species. DNA sequencing and polyacrylamide

gel electrophoresis are being used to determine the fish's relationship to other snappers. Stay tuned for the results of Ray's research....



Shepard's Reef Modules Deployed

Fishing Club member Lee Shepard of Lantana recently made a unique contribution to the enhancement



of our local reefs. Shepard's company, Intracoastal Eco-Systems (IES) has designed two space age looking reef modules that were sunk by the county just north of the Boynton Inlet in 35 feet of water. Each

module weighs approximately 2,600 pounds and is secured to the bottom with four fiberglass reinforced rebar legs. "It should be a grouper, yellowtail and mangrove snapper honey hole. I am hoping that with the mounted legs and significant mass they will stay put, even during storm surges. I am really looking forward to seeing how the modules perform," commented Shepard. Approximately 910 tons of limestone boulders were sunk near the site of the modules as well. The reef has about 8 feet of vertical relief. Baitfish began showing up at the site even as the material was being deployed. Earlier this year IES donated a 'Goliath Grouper Hotel'™ module to the county that was placed at the Peanut Island Snorkel Lagoon. IES works with waterfront businesses, marinas and home owners designing environmentally friendly structures, including artificial mangrove systems and custom dock LED lighting. the innovative work this Fishing Club member is doing to help enhance marine habitat.

It was a very special day for everyone involved for reasons well beyond just going fishing. One of the highlights occurred the evening before the scheduled fishing trip when Purple Heart recipient



away, then I realized it was a huge," said Pottlitzer who sells boats at Tuppen's Marine in Lake Worth. Jay battled the behemoth for about 45 minutes before it came into gaffing range. His girlfriend stuck the fish, but she was unprepared for what followed. "The fish was just too much for her to handle and it bolted with our gaff. It sounded and we didn't see the fish again for another 45 minutes. It's funny now, but at the time we were freaking out," said Jay. Fortunately, Jay had a back up gaff on board and even though it was a much smaller gaff it did the trick the next time the fish came into range. It

took both of us to lift the fish over the gunnel. We both fell to the deck when in came on board. I couldn't believe how big it was," continued Pottlitzer who has seen his share of nice catches over the years, but never a dolphin this large. Once the fish was in the box, Jay ran straight in to the certified scale at Lott Brothers Tackle Shop in North Palm Beach. The fish weighed in at exactly 70 pounds and measured 72 inches long. It eclipses every dolphin in the WPBFC's All Time Club Record book and is a new club record. The fish was so significant that renowned taxidermist **Raymond Douglas** from King Sailfish Mounts in Ft. Lauderdale has used it to make a mold from. "Raymond is really pumped. He said the detail he got is the best he has seen and thinks that this will be the best 'Big Fish' dolphin mount in the industry," said Pottlitzer. Jay has been a WPBFC member for nearly ten years and is a tournament regular in the club's annual Silver Sailfish Derby and Palm Beach County KDW Classic, fishing in his Contender, Leisure Boy. Now he can add WPBFC Record Holder

Longtime Club Records Busted

Eight new All Time Club Records have been added to the club record board. A few of these entries replace longstanding marks in the club's *All* Time Club Record Book. The most impressive entry is Jay Pottlitzer's 70 pound dolphin in the 50 General Tackle category. Jay's catch is the largest dolphin caught from local waters ever recorded in the club (see article on pg. 1). The family of **Rick** DeCarlo, a 29 year Fishing Club member from Longwood, Florida, is now well represented in the club record book. Rick's 33 pound redfish caught on 8 General tackle replaces a 59 year old record red that was caught off the Flotilla Club dock back in 1954. Rick's wife, **Robin**, and his son, **Stephen**, also landed in the club record book with their catches of black drum and ladyfish respectively. Joel Wilson of Jupiter bested a 40 pound, 2 ounce permit this spring replacing a 56 year old mark in the Unlimited tackle cat-

egory. Details on these and other new club records are listed below. Photographs of many of these new club records, as well as other existing records, can be viewed on the club website. Congratulations to all new WPBFC record holders!

Catch a Club Record?

To submit a catch for club record consideration members must send a completed WPBFC affidavit entry form along with a 30-foot line sample for testing within 14 days of the catch. The catch must be

witnessed and the fish must be weighed on land or a suitable stable surface (beached boat, wading on a flat, etc.) with a certified scale. If a hand scale is used, the scale must be re-certified by the club after the catch. Line samples are tested at Ande Monofilament using an electronic linetesting machine. A member of the WPBFC Angling Committee and an Ande Mono representative conduct and verify the line tests. 2012 trophy winners

Beinecke Atlantic Blue Marlin Trophy



Fishing Club member Mark Donohue of West Palm Beach won the 2012 Beinecke Atlantic Blue Marlin Trophy. Donohue caught and released four blue marlin off the Bahamas last year scoring 400 points in the yearlong trophy competition. He is a previous recipient of the prestigious award, winning it back in 2007 as well. Donohue was fishing with fellow club member Capt.

Greg Bogdan of North Palm Beach when the fish were caught. Donohue's four fish were enough to hold off other club members who registered blue marlin releases during the calendar year including Allison Kleisley, Mark Prazak, and Mike & Dawn Samuels. The Beinecke Atlantic Blue Marlin Trophy is awarded annually to the member of the WPBFC who scores the most release points for Atlantic blue marlin caught in Florida and Bahamian waters. Anglers receive 300 points for blue marlin released off Florida and 100 points for Bahamian blues. The Beinecke award has been presented by the WPBFC since 1960.

Tracy Schneider Memorial Trophy



Dawn Samuels of Palm Beach Gardens took the WPBFC's top sailfish release award for 2012, the Tracy Schneider Memorial Trophy. The Schneider Trophy is presented annually to the WPBFC member who scores the most sailfish release points in Florida waters. Samuels scored a total of 5,700 points (57 sailfish released using live bait) last year to earn the title. She outscored dozens of other Fishing Club members including junior angler Carl **Weigold** of Boca Raton who scored 4,300 points, posting an impressive 43 sailfish releases on live bait. Schneider Trophy competitors earn 100 points for sails caught and released on live bait, 300 points for dead bait caught sails, 500 points for sailfish

caught on pure artificial lures and 1,000 points for sails fooled with a fly.

Dick Jeck Memorial Billfish Tagging Award

No WPBFC members qualified for the Dick Jeck Memorial Billfish Tagging Award in 2012. The award is annually presented to the WPBFC member who tags the most billfish, including swordfish, off Florida and the Bahamas each calendar year. To be eligible, anglers must use approved Billfish Foundation or National Marine Fisheries Service tags. Trophy winners must be responsible for tagging a minimum of 20 fish during the calendar year.

James P. Nora Memorial Trophy

Dr. Greg Pientka of Boynton Beach won the 2012 James P. Nora Memorial Award with a 28-pound snook. Pientka caught, weighed and released the big fish in mid-October using a live mullet while

fishing in Ft. Pierce. Since 1965, the James P. Nora Me-

morial Award has been presented annually to the WPBFC member who catches the heaviest snook within Florida. The prestigious honor is sponsored by the Nora family of West Palm Beach in memory of James P. Nora who tragically died while snook fishing from the north jetty at the Palm Beach Inlet in 1964. Winning the Nora award is a prized honor among many south Florida snook fishermen.

Donald S. Leas, III **International Angling Trophy**

Longtime WPBFC member **Serena Wilson** of West Palm Beach earned last year's Donald S. Leas, III International Angling Trophy, also called the 'The Loving Cup'. Wilson released 19 blue marlin and boated a 72-pound yellowfin tuna off

St. Thomas, B.V.I., during several full moon periods last summer. Wilson also claimed the award back in 2007. Numerous other club members were in contention for the award including Brower Moffitt who posted 25 bonefish releases, mostly on fly tackle in the Bahamas, Mark Wodlinger who recorded 18 Pacific sailfish releases off Costa Rica and Molly **Fleming** who registered 10 Pacific Sailfish releases off Panama. The Leas International Angling Trophy is given to the WPBFC member who makes the most outstanding catches in international waters. All varieties of freshwater and saltwater game fish are eligible whether boated or released. The trophy is presented in loving memory of past WPBFC member Donald Stewart Leas, III by brothers Rodman Wanamaker-Leas and John Wanamaker-Leas.

Waller's Lucky Lure


After the kind of year he has had, longtime club member Gene Waller of North Palm Beach won't be leaving the dock to go fishing unless he has a few Ilander lures on board.

"That lure really looks like a flying fish jumping from the water when in digs down and then pops back up. I'm buying more of them at Lott Brothers tomorrow."

10 Years in the Sound

The panel was talking about the pompano bite; it had not materialized and was spotty, secondary to not enough cold weather. However, the bluefish and Spanish mackerel bite was good off of Pecks Lake. There was also talk of the cobia bite starting soon since the fish were working their way down the coast as a result of an approaching cold front. There is a pattern here – for the past ten years, the February fishing report has been pretty consistent.

The weather; well, we are blessed to be in South Florida. Out of the past ten years we have had three years of really cold weather; cold enough to make some anglers come in early and go home. This year had a nice start to the day, but the wind picked up and the water got choppy. It is certainly hard to complain since we could have been up north where some regions were enjoying a 36 to 40 inch snow fall!

Club member Mike Heitman bought Capt. Tore Turney's donated offshore fishing charter at last year's annual Awards BBQ & Silent Auction. "I was entertaining some legal clients and thought the trip with Tore would be perfect. We boarded Tore's center console, *Reel Lucky*, at New Port Cove Marina and picked up some freshly caught goggle eyes on our way out," recalled Heitman. The day began by trolling the edge in search of dolphin, but yielded little success. A gentle swell made for nice sea conditions, but the west wind was a harbinger of poor trolling. Tore's 'Plan B' was to head to the deep wreck scuttled by the Fishing Club several years ago in hopes of catching cobia. "Immediately, we started to get bites. We reeled as fast as we could, but every time we'd hook up sharks were taking our catch," said Heitman. A more aggressive tactic was needed. "As soon as we got a bite Tore would gun the motors helping us yank the cobia to the surface. Even then, the sharks would be in hot pursuit. We actually had sharks leaping

into the air chasing our cobia. When this happened Tore would throw both motors into full reverse and the prop wash would scare off the sharks long enough to gaff and boat the fish. It was a pretty crazy scene. We caught three nice cobia that day, including one 52" fish that we are hav. ing mounted. We had a great day on the water and took our catch to the Tiki Waterfront Sea Grill at Riviera Beach Marina afterwards for a fantastic fresh catch lunch."

Stanley Shenker also purchased a 1/2 day trip with Capt. Mark Dravo of Y-B Normal Charters, noting he had an "exciting" morning trip out of Ft. Pierce. 





'Absolut Joy' Wins 76th Silver Sailfish Derby

X7hat a difference a year makes. Unseasonably warm weather and blustery winds tested the 44 boat fleet fishing in the West Palm Beach Fishing Club's 76th annual Silver Sailfish Derby held January 10th through the The tournament 12^{th} . fleet, headquartered out of the Sailfish Marina on Singer Island, released a total of 185 sailfish during three days of fishing. It was a stark contrast to the world record setting 1,174 sailfish releases posted

by a 46 boat fleet during the 2012 Derby. "We can't set records every year," commented WPBFC Chairman and Derby radioman Pete Schulz. "The sailfish were still north of us during this year's Derby. There was a body of fish just south of Cape Canaveral, but without any strong cold fronts this winter, they had no reason to push further south in the droves we've seen in the past."

The slow bite made this year's *Derby* more competitive in terms of the number of teams that were in a position to win. "A double or triple header can shuffle the leader board in an instant," added Schulz. Derby leaders changed frequently on the first day. A strong east-southeast wind whipped sea conditions up to eight feet at one point in the day challenging even the biggest of boats. Locally based 'Absolut Joy', captained by Matt Rabenstine, earned top daily honors based on time on day one with 5 sailfish releases. Team 'Castings', one of the smallest boats in the Derby fleet at 27', also finished the day with five releases and registered a few impressive weight fish including a 31.8 lb. kingfish and a 28.7 lb. dolphin. "We had a great day. Fortunately, we caught every fish we saw today. That doesn't always happen," said team captain James Knox of West Palm Beach. Top daily angler the first day

was Peter Adrian of Miami aboard the '4 Aces', with 4 sailfish releases. The heavy weight fish on the first day was a 37.9 lb. cobia caught by Eric Hall aboard the 'Good Call'. A total of 69 sails were released on the Derby's first day. By comparison, the fleet was registering about that many per hour the previous year.

earned top daily boat honors on day two of the Derby with a total of 7 sailfish releases. High angler on day two was longtime Fishing Club member Janeen Davis of Riviera Beach, with 5 individual releases aboard the 'Mako'. The *Derby* fleet released a total of 71 sailfish on the second day. Heavy weight fish honors went to Luis Isaias of Coconut Grove, who landed a 39.7 lb. wahoo aboard the 'Jichi'. The fish would end up being the Grand Champion weight fish of the tournament.

The weather gods mercifully gave the *Derby* fleet a respite on the final day. Sea conditions were much calmer. Over a dozen boats were within just four fish of the lead. A real horse race developed with just a few hours remaining in the tournament when four boats were tied for the lead and several others were just one or two fish off the mark. The Derby fleet released a total of 45 sails on the final day. Team 'Hit'n Run', captained by Cory Gillespie, tallied 4 sailfish releases to win top daily boat honors on day three and 'Absolut Joy' angler and WPBFC member Susan **McCart** of Sarasota was the top daily angler. In the end, 'Absolut Joy' emerged as *Derby* champions with a total of 12 sailfish releases overall. Team '4 Aces', led by Capt.

> John Dudas, finished second overall with 11 releases. Team 'Hard Way', a 33' Contender, finished third overall with 10 releases and claimed the

> > Top Small Boat award, a new award featured in the Derby this year. Team 'Sandbob' from Ft. Lauderdale finished fourth overall on time with 9 sailfish releases. The prestigious Mrs.



Henry R. Rea trophy for the top individual angler, the oldest trophy in competitive sailfishing, went to '4 Aces' angler Peter Adrian with 9 individual sailfish releases on time. Angler Janeen Davis placed second overall individually with 9 releases and also earned the Top Lady Angler trophy. Susan McCart on 'Absolut Joy' placed third overall and **Mike Bondurandt**, of Ft. Lauderdale, fishing aboard the 'Sandbob' was the fourth place angler overall. Bondurandt also landed a 25.5 lb. cobia on the final day to earn a daily weight fish award. Team 'Reel Lucky', led by lifetime Fishing Club member **Capt. Tore Turney**, took home the Top Tag Team award for tagging a total of three sailfish with Billfish Foundation tags.

"The historic catch per boat day average in the *Derby* has been between 1.3 to 1.5 sails. The catch rate this year averages out to be 1.4 sails per boat day. So even though it seems like it was woefully slow fishing this year, it really falls within our historic average. We have been spoiled by ideal weather conditions and tremendous fishing the past several years," commented WPBFC Scientific Advisor **John Jolley**. The live scoring and photo gallery pages added to the tournament website were a huge hit this year. You can expect to see them return in next year's *Silver Sailfish Derby*, which is set for January 8th – 11th, 2014.

















Classic Yields Record Dolphin, Big Tuna

Unsettled weather preceding this year's Palm Beach County KDW Classic lead to some impres-

sive catches. "When the seas are rough for a prolonged period of time nobody is able to get offshore in advance of the tournament. The rough conditions move the fish around. It really shuffles the deck, so it has a tendency to level the playing field," commented Classic committee member



Capt. Eden White.

The strong easterly winds in late May ended up being a positive for blue water anglers, pushing good numbers of dolphin into the area. Fortunately, sea conditions subsided enough on tournament day for the fleet of nearly 200 boats to get offshore. Soon after fishing had concluded the weigh station was abuzz with anglers and well over one hundred onlookers who were packed on the bleachers watching the show unfold. Scores of double-digit dolphin were brought to the scale, including a record setting 57.6 pound bull caught by angler **Jim Witt** aboard 'Witt's End'. The fish prompted huge cheers from the crowd and earned Witt top honors including the Ande Monofilament Big Fish Bonus and 'King of the Classic' title. Compared to previous years in the *Classic* the number of dolphin entered

this year was up and kingfish entries were down, which no doubt was a result of the weather conditions leading

up to the event. The real show stopper came late in the day when captain **David Harris** and his crew aboard the 'Goin' Raptor' brought their 112 pound yellowfin tuna to the scale. The impressive fish, caught on 20 pound class tackle, ate a live goggle-eye suspended from a kite in 240 feet of water off Jupiter. "For most of the battle we had no idea what we had on. We thought it might be a shark for a while. But thankfully we stayed with it. The intensity really kicked in when we saw that yellow color in the water," said Harris. While not an eligible species, the big tuna is the largest fish



ever weighed in the tournament's eleven year history. Angler **Sher**ri **Beswick** earned the 'Queen of the Classic' title fishing aboard 'Spiced Rum III' with a 25.8

pound kingfish. It was the second time she has won the prestigious lady angler honor. **Mikayla Lamb** claimed the first place Junior award with her 22.2 kingfish.



what the Palm Beach fleet uses) and network with other anglers to help you determine what the best depth is that day. Typically, the sail bite improves the first few days following a cold front. Once the front blows through it is often 'Game On'. Sailfish seekers can also expect to encounter an occasional dolphin and wahoo. If it is a mild winter and seas are calm try trolling further offshore in 600 to 1000 feet for sails, dolphin and a shot at an occasional blue marlin. While cruising to and from the sailfish grounds keep an eye peeled for cobia swimming in the shallows along the beach. Drifting dead sardines in 60 to 120 feet near wrecks or natural reefs should yield kingfish, muttons, yellowtail and mangrove snapper. Light tackle jigging with metal jigs is a fun way to fish for schooling kings. Slow troll a hefty live bait in the Zoo off Lost Tree Village or off the Dodge Wall south of Palm Beach Inlet if you are looking for a smoker king. Spanish mackerel, pompano and small bluefish will be plentiful along beaches, especially in areas where you find a distinct clean water, cloudy water edge. The shallows off the Bath & Tennis Club on Palm Beach has been a good spot in recent years. Other traditional haunts are the areas near the Juno and Lake Worth Piers, and rock piles off Boynton. If you're having trouble finding fish try trolling a jig or swimming plug along the beach. Cooler temperatures heat up action in the Lake Worth Lagoon too. Tarpon fishing at Palm Beach Inlet and near the Sailfish Club docks will be good after sunset. Drift live mullet or live shrimp on a full moon falling tide. Cast

a Gulfstream redfish jig and shrimp combo around dock pilings, channel edges or deep holes to catch ladyfish, sheepshead, pompano, lane snapper, small black drum and jacks. The jig and shrimp combo will also yield an occasional snook, trout, flounder and redfish. Dock lights will be loaded with snook and moonfish, they will be feeding on small shrimp and minnows when the water is moving.

FEBRUARY

Sailfishing remains the offshore highlight, however as the month progresses the action begins to dissipate and move further south. Sardines and pilchards will likely be more prevalent, so use them for bait if you can find them. Passing cold fronts continue to be the best prompt to go fly the kite for sails. This has historically been an outstanding month for large African pompano outside Palm Beach Inlet and over artificial reefs like the Ande wreck off Singer Island. The days leading up to the full moon are when the bite is best. However, their abundance has really declined

in recent years. The Juno Ledge is where you will be likely to find smoker kings. You'll catch tarpon, and an occasional horse-eye jack, snook or permit, while drifting the falling tide along the Sailfish Club docks and near the current edges that form at the tip of the south jetty at Palm Beach Inlet. Fish at night with live shrimp or mullet. By the end of the month the annual shark migration will be in full swing. Anglers can find exciting shallow water encounters with spinner sharks off Singer Island and Palm Beach, when the water is clear you will have no trouble seeing them. Anchor and chum to bring the fish within range.

MARCH

This is a transitional period when the wind is often the angler's biggest nemesis. The sail bite continues to slow, but the dolphin bite will improve. A 10knot easterly wind and a good color change are ideal conditions this time of year, but those days are usually few and far between in March. Amberjack, grouper and mutton snapper will be holding near deepwater wrecks like the WPBFC Reef (Celtic Crusader) in 225 feet and the Rybovich Endowment Reef (Sylvina Express) in 270 feet, both off Singer Island and the Boynton Kiwanis Reef (Skycliffe) in 200 feet. Kingfish and Spanish mackerel are still abundant. By the end of the month increased numbers of amberjack will con-

gregate over the deepwater artificial reefs. Large sharks often shadow the AJ's, and the sharks are often accompanied by cobia. So keep a pitch rod loaded with a live bait or a jig on the ready. The shark migration along the beach peaks this month. The best bites are usually triggered by strong north winds. This was the month a few years back when club members rewrote the tripletail category in the WPBFC Record Book. The tripletail had invaded the Loxahatchee River after a prolonged period of unseasonably cold weather. While it was a unique phenomenon for sure, some nice fish have been caught each season since in the river. This is the month to find them.

APRIL

The 100 foot depth range east of the Juno Beach Pier is a prime spot to live bait with sardines, goggle-eye or blue runners for smoker kings. Trolling bonito or mullet strips in combination with a Seawitch on a planer is an alternative to live baiting that will also effectively catch kings. Off Palm Beach Inlet and points further south, look for kingfish, dolphin and a few wahoo along the 120 ledge providing the water has a favorable blue hue and if there has been a persistent easterly wind. A glance in the Club Record Book confirms that this is the month for big bluefish. The slammer blues will be making their annual migration to the north. Anglers looking for kings or dolphin sometimes encounter large schools of the double-digit sized bluefish well offshore. The ravenous blues will eat anything thrown their way. Some of these fish find their way inshore into places like the Loxahatchee River and Little Lake Worth. It's a good idea to have a top water plug outfit ready to go no matter where you are fishing this month. It will likely come in handy.

MAY

For shear variety this is perhaps the best month to fish off the Palm Beaches. The WPBFC Record Book is littered with outstanding local catches made this month, highlighted by some very large dolphin and outstanding blackfin tuna records. If

the wind stays out of a southeasterly quadrant for more than three or four days that should be your cue to rig up some ballyhoo and head offshore. Monitoring what kind of dolphin bite has been taking place to the south off Miami-Dade and the Keys will give you a good indication of what to expect at our doorstep a few days later. The zone

between the Tiara condo on Singer Island and the Breakers Hotel on Palm Beach is a traditional blackfin tuna hot spot. Fish with live sardines along the clean water edge in 100 to 180 feet of water and watch for showering flying fish or ballyhoo. A light southeast wind and a moderate to strong current are ideal conditions for live baiting the edge. Other productive spots include the rips that form in 90 to 180 feet between the Juno Pier and Jupiter Inlet, the area straight off Boynton Inlet between 70 and 110 feet and the 90 to 150 depth range off the Boynton Martini Glass. The best blackfin bite occurs

early in the morning and at sunset. Live chumming with small baits like pilchards or threadfin herring is by far the best way to fire up the fish. Drifting the edge of the reef for mutton and yellowtail snapper will be productive this month. The High Bar off Jupiter and the deep reef off Boynton Inlet are excellent snapper spots. Go no further than the Juno Ledges to tussle with schools of bonito that will be arriving for their seasonal summer visit.

JUNE

As the summer progresses you will likely have to travel further offshore to find dolphin. Being the first to arrive on an offshore weedline can make a big difference in what ends up in your fish box at the end of the fishing day. If you can't find a weedline, look for a good edge or temperature break to troll along, and always keep an eye peeled for a soaring frigate bird or feeding terns. Lone frigates often follow large pelagic fish that have pushed baitfish to the surface. If you venture offshore pay attention to those afternoon thunderstorms too, yet another good reason to get an early start. There is generally a good early morning kingfish bite in 90 to 120 feet between the north end of the Singer Island condos and the Juno Pier. In the late afternoon fish a little shallower for the kings, in 60 to 90 foot depths. A slow trolled live bait late in the day off the Juno Ledge will also yield African pompano, barracuda and summertime sailfish. Swarms of bonito will be well entrenched this month along the edge of the reef in 90 to 150 feet of water from Boynton to the Juno Ledges. Their presence can be both a blessing and a curse. While many anglers

tire quickly of bonito bites, bigger fish like smoker kings, wahoo and billfish will be lurking, and feeding, around the bonito schools. Fish the outside edges of the bonito schools with big baits to find the quality fish.

JULY

This is another outstanding month to target dolphin. A tactic used by many anglers this time of year is to blast out the inlet on a southeast heading looking for a weedline or floating debris. A good routine to practice if you are fishing out of Palm Beach Inlet is to head 120 degrees offshore and begin a zig-zag trolling pattern in

450 to 550 feet of water heading north. If you are unsuccessful after an hour or two of trolling, make a move back to the reef and target kings and snapper. Drift dead sardines on triple hook rigs on the High Bar off Jupiter, the 70 to

120 foot depths off the Bath & Tennis Club on Palm Beach or near the 60 and 90 foot reefs just south of Boynton Inlet. Bonito will remain plentiful off the 120 foot ledge. The days leading up to the full moon are a prime time to

catch wahoo. High speed trolling has been the most productive technique in recent years. The key is getting on the water at daybreak and working the edge of the deep reef, especially on the outside edge of bonito schools. The 120 to 300 foot depths are typically best. The full moon period is also a great time to fish the reef at night for kingfish and snapper. Big tarpon will be cruising just off the beach on their annual summer migration. Look for rolling fish or 'dark logs' lying over the sand. A slow and silent approach is a must when positioning the boat for your cast. The best chances at finding fish will come on mornings when the surf is calm. The beaches north of Jupiter Inlet and south of Palm Beach Inlet are two spots where you are likely to find them. Big permit will be hanging around shallow reefs and wrecks north of Jupiter Inlet. A live crab is the bait of choice. The dark of the moon is an excellent time to target swordfish, day or night. Humps in 1,200 to 1,600 feet scattered between Palm Beach and Boca are good places to fish. Fishing far offshore in a small boat at night can be dangerous. Extreme caution is required if you decide to drift the Gulfstream for broadbills. Go with a buddy boat and keep a watchful eye out for buoy gear, other boats and freighter traffic. Catch and release snook fishing at local inlets will be in full swing. The fish are in spawning mode, so if

you go be sure to use circle hooks and take time to properly revive the fish. Early morning walks along local beaches when the surf is calm and clear is a great way to experience excellent light tackle snook action.

AUGUST

The days leading up to the full moon will once again be your cue to troll the edge for wahoo. However, early morning high speed trolling is not the only technique that works. Drifting live baits off the edge in conjunction with

a flasher will raise fish like wahoo, summertime sails and tuna. Cold water upwellings can plague anglers this time of year making reef fishing conditions challenging. The cold water can also be a blessing moving schools of vermillion snapper into shallower water. Be prepared to drop strips of squid on guppy rigs if you mark a cloud of fish hugging the bottom. Fish shallow reefs in the 40 to 60 foot depths this month to catch mangrove snapper. As a general rule, on days when there is no current or a dreaded south tide, try bottom fishing in deeper water. This is a good time to hit the deep water wrecks Off Singer Island. On days when the current is screaming to the north, try bottom fishing in shallower water north of Jupiter Inlet well inside the deep ledge. Summer rains will have local spillways open. The snook will bite best during the first day of the freshwa-

ter release, especially if the flood gates have been closed for a period of time. Small tarpon can be found rolling in the North Fork of the Loxahtachee and in the north end of the



Lake Worth Lagoon around Old Port Cove and in Little Lake Worth. The tarpon action will remain good through the mullet run.

SEPTEMBER

The current usually slows down during the fall season making it an ideal time to target vellowtail, mangrove and mutton snapper. The High Bar ledge that runs from Juno to Jupiter is one of the most productive spots for yellowtail. The top of the reef is around 60 feet and the bottom of the reef lies in about 80 feet. The bigger yellowtails usually suspend higher in the water column over the reef. Small yellow jigs tipped with a strip of squid or fresh bonito works very well for the yellowtails. Guppy rigs are perfect for this style of fishing also, especially if you have kids on board. We will begin to see some northeast winds and perhaps a few tropical systems. An ocean swell from this change in weather will trigger mutton snapper to move into shallow near shore reefs. Your cue to go snapper fishing is when you hear reports of muttons being caught at local inlets or piers. By the end of the month the mullet run should be well underway. Finger mullet are usually the first to show up and with them will be the biggest ladyfish of the year, snook, tarpon, jacks and just about any other fish that swims. The first week or two of the month is your best chance to catch a legal snook at local inlets. The fish really key on specific baits that are prevalent at the time. You may be fishing with great looking mullet, but the fish may only be responding to smaller baits like sardines. The snook will begin moving out of local inlets with the first ocean swell. Much of the action this month is on the reef and inshore, however there are typically some offshore



highlights. Marauding schools of small blackfin tuna and some decent sized skipjack tuna can be found feeding in anywhere from 90 to 240 feet. Try trolling small feathers way back in your spread or live chumming with small baits and casting jigs. Also, each fall, late September through October, there is a small run of blue marlin that generally takes place off the southeast Florida coast. The 300 to 1,000 foot zone is where you want to focus your search. Large natural baits like horse ballyhoo behind a blue and white

Islander lure or a split-tail mullet are excellent offerings.

OCTOBER

Typically, the mullet run will peak during the early part of the



month. If we haven't had too many storms, or northeast fronts you can expect the run to last longer. This is by far the most exciting time to fish the beach. Try to network with other anglers up and down the coast to monitor the movements of mullet schools. Snook, tarpon and a host of other hungry predators will be awaiting the arrival of mullet at spots like Blowing Rocks, the Juno and Lake Worth Piers, and local inlets. The key is to get to these spots when the mullet first show up. That's when the bite will be best. While redfish are not a regular catch in our area, this is the month when they are most likely to show up. They often follow the mullet schools and will be caught in places like the Loxahatchee River, Jupiter Inlet and Palm Beach Inlet. Reef fishing for snapper continues to be productive. Dolphin fishing can be surprisingly good, especially following offshore storms. Hurricanes and tropical systems that pass us to the south often bring weedlines and a variety of fish attracting flotsam off our coast.

November

Cool weather with the wind blowing from a northern quadrant, clean water and an abundance of bait will bring the first wave of sailfish to the region, most likely late in the month. Our sailfish activity largely depends upon these

three factors coming together. If they don't and the weather is unseasonably warm, or if there is very little bait, that should be your cue to push out to deeper water in the 200 to 400 feet range to look for sails and dolphin. This depth zone can be very fishy when you find a good clean water edge. Dead bait trollers from Jupiter north gener-

ally experience the best early season shots at sails. Surf fishing will continue to improve for pompano, bluefish and Spanish mack-Nighttime fishing the week leading up to the full moon will be good for mangrove, mutton and yellowtail snappers on the reef. The deep holes scattered through-

out the Lake Worth Lagoon come to life this time of year with lane snapper, jacks, bluefish, ladyfish and pompano.

DECEMBER

The first big bites of the annual sailfish season usually take place this month and will peak the following month. Sailfish activity will pick up noticeably after a few cold fronts push through the region. You should stay on the lookout for sailfish tailing down sea when the water quality is good, a dark blue, and the wind is blowing strong out of the north. Strong ocean swells associated with passing cold fronts will generate good gag grouper action in 50 to

100 feet of water near reef ledges, rock piles and artificial reefs from Jupiter to Boynton. The best spots are often small areas that are not as easily located by divers and anglers. So do your homework. Juno Beach remains a productive spot for surf casters seeking blues and pompano. This is the month when sheepshead begin schooling up inside the throat of Palm Beach Inlet. Fresh shrimp fished on the bottom will do the trick. Fly rod fans and

light tackle lovers will find consistent action with ladyfish, jacks, black drum, pompano, small snook and an occasional redfish in the Loxahatchee River and throughout the Lake Worth Lagoon.

For the past two decades the Palm P Beach County Fishing Foundation (PBCFF) has awarded a scholarship in marine biology to deserving undergraduate students at Palm Beach Atlantic University (PBA). The scholarships are one of the community-based programs funded through the foundation's John Rybovich Endowment. The Fishing Club and its charitable foundation have built a very special relationship with PBA staff members and students through the years. Fishing Club member Dr. Ray Waldner, a PBAU biology professor, has played a key role in coordinating the scholarship. PBA's Alumni Relations staffer Delesa Morris recently reached out to some of our past scholarship recipients to see where their career paths have lead them...their responses were quite impressive and heartwarming. While not all past recipients stayed in fields related to marine biology, many did, and they are now making significant contributions in their communities and in the world of environmental research.

• The PBCFF's very first scholarship recipient was John Rostash in 1994. After graduating from PBA John went to work for an environmental laboratory in Ohio, which eventually lead to a position as a water treatment operator. He now works in zoning & floodplain administration. "My career has taken a circuitous route since graduation but, as a community floodplain administrator I feel connected to the natural sciences and protection of our recreational fishing resources. I never would have had the confidence to take on these challenges and opportunities had it not been for professors like Dr. Raymond Waldner and an organization like the Palm Beach County Fishing Foundation. The confidence and validation that the scholarship instilled in me is touching the lives of the community I now serve here in Crawford County, Ohio."

• **Paul Thomas**, the 1995 & 1996 PBCFF scholarship recipient, went on to become a Research Biologist for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Research Institute.

PBCFF Supports Dolphin Tagging Effort

The West Palm Beach Fishing Club's charitable affiliate, the Palm Beach County Fishing Foundation has donated \$1,000 to the Charleston, South Carolina, based Dolphinfish Research Program. It is the fourth year in a row the PBCFF has provided financial support to the program. Dolphin are among the most sought after species of fish that WPBFC members pursue. Fishing Club members Capt. Bob Frevert and Capt. Bouncer Smith have been actively engaged in the program for years. These anglers and others routinely tag dozens of dolphin each season, which is helping unlock

the mysteries associated with dolphinfish life history. Critical information is being learned about dolphinfish migratory patterns as a result of this ongoing research program. More than 1,100 fish were tagged in 2012 and over 2,700 fish were sampled for length, weight and sex data. Among those recorded were 40 dolphin caught during the 2012 Palm Beach County KDW Classic that were sampled by Fishing Club volunteers. In this year's KDW Classic, a total of 53 dolphin were sampled. "The data collected by Fishing Club volunteers was some of the most organized and accurate we have seen to date from participating tournaments," said Dolphinfish Tagging Program coordinator, Don Hammond. A Dolphin Update...

t a meeting earlier this year of Athe SAFMC's Dolphin/Wahoo Advisory Panel. **Don Hammond** of the Dolphinfish Research Program revealed some new tagging statistics that makes you think. Based on tag recaptures, 50% of the fish recaptured moved 20-70 miles north per day after release (If you plan on fishing for dolphin tomorrow, don't worry about how someone did out front, find out how they did from Boca and points south the day before). A dolphin tagged off of Marathon Key in May was recaptured 9 days later off Oregon Inlet, NC. One tagged off Key West was recaptured 49 days later off Montauk, NY.

Here is the interesting thing and something the entire panel was concerned about: A large percentage of the tagged fish that are recaptured 180 days to 1+ years after tagging off the east coast of the U.S. were recaptured in the northeast corner of the Caribbean. A few tags were recaptured on the Mid-Atlantic Ridge west of the Azores. Hammond believes a good number of these fish ride the Gulfstream north following the current down the Mid-Atlantic Ridge and end up back in the Caribbean. Hammond also speculates that

these fish move up the Old Bahamas Channel to intercept the Gulfstream off the Keys or head under Cuba to pick up the loop current, which takes them into the Gulf of Mexico and then back down around the Keys and north again. Pop-off satellite tags deployed by Hammond's group off Puerto Rico support this premise with all fish taking these two routes after release. They've also determined that female dolphinfish off Puerto Rico are "heavier" than females in other areas. They are researching why these fish are bigger... Does this mean there is a spawning aggregation in the Carib-



bean. Hammond also speculates that Tim Nettles with a nice summertime dolphin

bean, or just more food for them down there? More studies are forthcoming.

Looking forward, there is cause for concern. We all know these fish are pelagic. There are rumors of ramped up commercial fishing effort with longlines and double trawl boats targeting dolphin in the Caribbean. Further concerns deal with the Chinese investing large sums of money in the Caribbean islands and the Bahamas and what impacts this may have on marine resources. On the positive side of the equation, the dolphin fishery is more like an annual crop than a fishery. At the Advisory Panel meeting meeting we were told over 90% of the fish are one year old or less. We just have to let enough of the little ones spawn as they pass thru the gauntlet of South Florida. Incredibly, dolphin begin spawning at 14 inches and all of them have spawned at least once by 24 inches. That's good news.

26th annual Kid's Fishing Day...Always Room for Change

This year's annual *Kid's Fishing Day* proved lacksquare that even after twenty-six years of coordinating this educational outreach event there is always room for improvement. Thanks to the insights from some creative volunteers we were able to modify our programming in subtle ways that made a big differ-

ence in the quality of the *Kid's Fishing Day* experience for all involved. Nearly 400 kids from throughout Palm Beach County took part in the event, many of whom had not yet been introduced to saltwater fishing or experienced the excitement of riding on a big boat. Club member **Bob Pascale** of Tequesta volunteered to be the seawall fishing coordinator this year. His idea of making the seawall fishing experience

an educational station for smaller groups of kids, rather than the entire group fishing at once as had been done in previous years, allowed for more one-on-one instruction, helping teach the kids how to use the gear they would later go home with. "It worked out great. I think just about every kid caught a fish off the sea wall. The small circle hooks really helped too," said Pascale who also spent time

> chumming the area before each group arrived at the station. Club member Jeffrey Malsky of West Palm

Beach improved the Tackle Box station this year by incorporating the actual hooks, lures and gear that was included in each kid's Fish Florida tackle kit. Volunteer **Henry Inserra** of North Palm Beach, a past WPBFC Volunteer of the Year recipient, modified the Casting station by letting the kids

practice with spinning rods, instead of using the spin cast rods that had been used in years past. This also helped prepare them for their seawall fishing experience. Changes in how each youth group rotated through the educational stations were also made this year, allowing volunteers a little extra 'down time' between teaching sessions. "We were able to socialize with other volunteers so much more this year,

which really made it more enjoyable for everyone. It's fun getting to know other club members in this environment," said Inserra. Choppy sea conditions on the final two days forced the drift boat to stay inshore on most trips. "It actually was a blessing. The kids had a great boat ride in the Intracoastal. We fished some of the nearby inshore artificial reefs and they caught plenty of lane snapper and grunts, probably more fish than they would have caught offshore. 




More Rods & Reels For Kids



The Palm Beach County Fishing Foundation (PBCFF) has donated over 100 rod & reel combos to area youth groups this year, including 32 light spin-

ning outfits to the City of Riviera Beach Parks & Recreation program. The rods and reels were used for a citysponsored kids fishing program held at the Riviera Beach Marina in late March. "It was very rewarding giving a little of myself back to what I am so passionate about.
